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## Needle Felting Workshops Continue at the Bellamy-Ferriday House & Garden



**Bethlehem, CT-** Connecticut Landmarks' Bellamy-Ferriday House & Garden will host its second needle felting workshop this season on Sunday, June 27<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 pm. The class is designed to guide the beginner through a simple project to create needle felted flowers. Cost of workshop is \$30 which includes barbed needles, foam, wool roving and instructions to make a flower in class and another at home. The workshop series will continue on July 25<sup>th</sup> and August 22<sup>nd</sup> beginning at 2:00 pm for ages 12 and up. These workshops will focus on creating Caroline's pony and dogs. The workshop is taught by Artist Dianne Parmalee who will provide an introduction to an exciting and easy method of creating fiber art. Needle Felting is a simple, fun craft that uses only loose wool roving material and a felting needle to create whatever the mind can imagine. Wool roving, a form of wool that is made right before it is spun into yarn, is a completely organic material from a local sheep farm. Dianne will present her Stillwater Shetland Sheep as part of the workshop and will be using their fleece. The craft requires no glue, thread or other binding

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materials, making them safe for children to play with, and also adorable "natural" looking creatures.

The Bellamy-Ferriday House & Garden, located at 9 Main Street North, Bethlehem is open May 1<sup>st</sup> through October 11<sup>th</sup>. Hours are as follows: May-August, Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, 11am-4pm; September-October, Friday, Saturday and Sunday 11am-4pm. Admission is \$7 for adults; \$6 for students, teachers and seniors; \$4 for children age 6-18; children under 6 and Connecticut Landmarks' members are free. Families, 2 adults and children, are \$15; groups of 10 or more are \$5 each. ### **About the Bellamy-Ferriday House & Garden**

The Bellamy-Ferriday House & Garden embodies the dramatically different passions of two extraordinary individuals. Bethlehem pastor Rev. Joseph Bellamy, a renowned leader of the Great Awakening, the emotional religious revival of the 1740s, built the house in two stages, beginning in 1754. The 100 acre farmstead with numerous outbuildings remained in the family until 1868. In 1912, New Yorkers Henry and Eliza Ferriday acquired it as a summer residence. Around 1915, Mrs. Ferriday and her daughter, Caroline, designed a formal parterre garden, introducing a wide variety of trees, shrubs, and perennials, sweeping lawns and evergreens to provide more privacy from the road. Today the garden still displays these beautiful features.

Founded in 1936, Connecticut Landmarks, formerly known as the Antiquarian & Landmarks Society, is the largest state-wide heritage museum organization in Connecticut.
